1. Background and Purpose

In the Basis of Union, it is highlighted that the church belongs to Christ, and that he will continually renew it:

'The Uniting Church acknowledges that the Church is able to live and endure through the changes of history only because its Lord comes, addresses, and deals with people in and through the news of his completed work. Christ who is present when he is preached among people is the Word of God who acquits the guilty, who gives life to the dead and who brings into being what otherwise could not exist. Through human witness in word and action, and in the power of the Holy Spirit, Christ reaches out to command people's attention and awaken faith; he calls people into the fellowship of his sufferings, to be the disciples of a crucified Lord; in his own strange way Christ constitutes, rules and renews them as his Church.'

Basis of Union, paragraph 4

It is in our DNA that we will be open to change and Christ's leading. This does not commit us to an easy journey, although it does commit us to a journey where we seek renewal in the hope of the risen Christ.

In 1977 the churches of Orange that came together to form the Uniting Church were strong in human and financial resources, and there seemed to be no obvious reason to rationalise premises and combine worship services. In the intervening 41 years we, along with many other churches, have seen a gradual decline in membership and financial resources, and with this has come the understanding that we must rethink our mission and ministry in order to 'live and endure through the changes of history'. Our task is not simply to survive, but find freedom beyond mere survival, and allow Christ to do his work as he 'rules and renews [us] as his Church'.

It has been stated on more than one occasion that the last reason that we should make major changes within the Uniting Church congregations of Orange should be to save money. In fact, we should always be looking at how we can better live out the mission of Jesus in this city and surrounds and model the sacrificial attitude of Jesus as we seek to do this. The reality is, of course, that money does talk and that given our changed circumstances we no longer have the resources to maintain our current structure. With this motivation we have set out to completely reassess the use of our resources in the life and witness of the Uniting Church in Orange, and we are trying to keep uppermost in our minds that saving as much money as possible is not our chief end. We are aiming to reallocate resources, but not to such a degree that our life and witness is completely hamstrung. We are walking a fine line, but we do not go through this time of discernment relying only on human resources, but 'in the power of the Holy Spirit, [as] Christ reaches out to command people's attention and awaken faith.'

Vision, Mission and Values

The process of change and discernment has been intense over this last year, and ironically, for some it has been too fast and for others it has been too slow.

The key aspect of the year has been the task of discerning together what our vison and mission is for the Uniting Church in Orange. We had done some work in previous years as we considered what it is to be a missional church, and last year we undertook various one-on-one conversations with people as the Guiding Team did its work of appreciative inquiry. At the end of 2017 we undertook the National Church Life Survey, and this gave us many more insights into the life and health of the congregations of the Uniting Church in Orange.

In February this year we added to this by sharing together in three vision and mission sessions. This was a very encouraging time as the congregations came together to share hopes, dreams and concerns for the future. A number of people shared, with surprise, that many of these hopes, dreams and concerns were common to all.

These evenings helped us to think about what is most important to us and helped us to develop the vision statement, mission statement and set of values that appeared earlier in this document.

Following these evenings, a survey was undertaken with the children to listen to their views and concerns about life and church.

The information gathered in these various areas has been used to set up three action teams to focus on the current and future life and witness of Orange Uniting Church in the areas of Worship, Pastoral Care and Community Engagement. These action teams have since met together in a day long workshop and are now continuing the work of discernment

Worship

The last year has seen some experiments in combined worship for the four city congregations. Wesley and The 10am Project have been worshipping together twice a month since July 2016, and it was decided to extend this to include Fiveways and St John's from July 2018. This was seen as a time of transition and a way to help the four city congregations step into a new style of worship twice month while still maintaining their familiar worship on the other Sundays. This has been a time of great joy for some people and a time of real challenge for others. It is hoped that the congregation will use this time of transition and learning to better shape the worship of one city congregation in the coming year.

Governance

Since the formation of the Uniting Church, the congregations in and around Orange have remained separate congregations with their own church councils and have cooperated in

various forms through this time. The most recent form of this co-operation has been what is known as 'Orange Uniting Church Parish'. With Presbytery approval, each of the congregations has delegated the responsibility for calling and the oversight of ministers of the word and for matters of finance, property and communication, to the Orange Parish Co-ordinating Team. The Team comprises five members elected from across the parish, an appointed member from each of the seven congregations and the Minister of the Word in placement in the parish.

In order to visibly show the new stage that the congregations are entering into, to aid the shared ownership of decisions and to align with the governance structures of the Uniting Church, it was decided that proposals would be taken to the congregations to dissolve the 'Orange Uniting Church Parish' co-operating structure and to close the individual congregations and form a new 'Orange Uniting Church Congregation' which would have one church council with oversight of the eight worship centres. The proposals would also include a proposal to transfer the 'beneficial rights' of the properties from each individual congregation to the new Orange Uniting Church Congregation. The three proposals were presented to the seven congregations at their congregational meetings during July, August and September and were passed unanimously by all congregations. These changes will come into effect on the 30th of November 2018.

Services of celebration and closure are planned for each of the seven congregations during October and November and a special service to launch the Orange Uniting Church Congregation is planned for Sunday the 2nd of December with the NSW/ACT Moderator, the Rev Simon Hansford. as the guest preacher.

Buildings

A significant amount of time and energy has been spent considering the buildings and properties that we own in the city. We often hear it said, that the church is the people and not the buildings, and this is true, but it is also true that the buildings that the church worships in are special places to the church members and the wider community. Talk of change, closure, sale and lease is very painful for many people. However, we have made a commitment to put everything on the table before God and discern the best use for our properties in relation to the goals of our mission plan, with an aim to combine all of our worship and mission activities on one site.

In order to assess the buildings we have had a visit, and received a report from Synod Property Services; we have undertaken to assess the maintenance costs of our properties for the coming ten years; we have sought and had conversations with Uniting, Kinross Wolaroi School, Orange City Council, Orange Regional Conservatorium and other organisations about possible new uses for our buildings; we have spoken to real estate agents regarding leasing or selling our buildings; we have engaged in community forums regarding the needs of a modern regional city; and we continue to gather as much

information as possible. We have been well supported in this task by the Synod Mission and Property Project staff and other synod, Uniting Resources and presbytery representatives.

It is our hope that we can gather enough information and, combined with this mission plan, we can develop a property proposal that makes sense to our minds. The harder part will be how our hearts respond to what seems sensible, and we will seek God's and each other's comfort and support as we go through what may be a time of grief.

Conclusion

Accompanying this has been the departure of some dear friends and members of the congregations as they have chosen to leave the Uniting Church on account of the decisions that we made at the National Assembly about same gender marriage. We are sad about this but are thankful that we have not fallen out over this issue. We acknowledge the good grace with which these people left, and their desire that we maintain a relationship with each other as old friends and as brothers and sisters in Christ.

All of these areas of focus have made for a difficult and tiring year, but we look forward to new things that are coming. In the year ahead, we expect to see some new ideas and activities being formed, and continued support for many of the long-standing activities of the congregations.

We are seeking to be a church that gets alongside the God of Mission, as we serve our community. We are seeking to be a healthy church that is able to support the mission of the Uniting Church in Australia through our involvement in, the work of the Macquarie Darling Presbytery, and the Synod of New South Wales and the ACT.

We are people of the resurrection, and we look to the hope of resurrection in all the deaths that we face. The resurrection was surprising for the first Christians, but they ultimately embraced the new thing that was occurring, and wonderful life and hope was shared in the good news of Jesus.

Evaluate

This mission plan is an integral part of determining the work of Orange Uniting Church in the coming two to three years. It is important that it does not 'remain on a shelf' or become redundant as other things change in the coming months.

We will evaluate the work of the mission plan and reflect on its progress to keep the plan uppermost in our minds and to make sure that our work remains focussed.

The first full evaluation will take place in September 2019 and will involve members of the action teams and the church council as well as feedback from the congregation members.

Following this the plan will be amended, extended or built on as necessary, taking into account the current position and resources that will be needed in the coming years.
